REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR AND THE STATE LEGISLATURE TO SET ASSIDE DIFFERENCES AND WORK EXPEDITIOUSLY TOWARD SULVING THE CURRENT CRISIS IN EDUCATIONAL FUNDING.

- VHEREAS, education of our children should reflect the highest priority of all services provided by state government; and
- WHEREAS, the state budget for 1991-92 does not reflect the high priority presented in the Governor's educational reform plan; and
- VHIRPAS, education should be the last resource of our state to absorb budget cuts; and
- VHEREAS, education has taken a disproportionate share of cuts in the 1991-92 state budget; and
- VHEREAS, the Legislature has failed to address educational funding problems in the state, causing increased budgetary pressures on local governments; and
- WHEREAS, local governments do not possess adequate funding resources to solve the problems created by the Legislature's and the Governor's failure to adequately fund educational services that presently exist in the State of Tennessee; and
- WHEREAS, failure to adequately fund the education system will have an adverse effect on the educational and employment opportunities of our children and the long term economic well-being of our state.
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of Loudon County, Tennessee assembled this 5th day of August, 1991, request that the Governor and the Legislature set aside differences and work in an expeditious manner toward restoring state cuts in funding the 1991-92 educational programs of the state; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Commissioners request that Senator Patten, and Representative Gunnels support the convening of a special session of the Legislature as soon as possible to provide a method for properly funding education programs in the state; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution should not be construed as an endorsement of a state income tax.
