in regular session in Loudon, Tennessee on the 7th day of February, 2011.

The **Honorable Roy Bledsoe** called the meeting to order.

Commissioner Duff opened the County Commission Meeting, led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and **Mayor Herron** gave the invocation.

Thereupon **Chairman Bledsoe** announced the presence of a quorum.

Present was the **Honorable Mayor Estelle Herron**.

(4) Agenda Adopted As Amended **Chairman Bledsoe** requested that the February 7, 2011 Agenda be adopted. **Mayor Herron** requested the addition to the Agenda of Consideration of the Blankenship Cemetery Road under Roads Commissioner Simpson's Items.

A motion was made by Commissioner Franke with a second by Commissioner

Maples to adopt the Agenda as amended.

A motion was made by Commissioner Jenkins with a second by Commissioner

Yarbrough to approve the minutes as amended. Upon voice vote the motion **Passed** unanimously.

(6) Comments: Agenda Items

Chairman Bledsoe asked that any visitor wishing to address the Commission regarding items on the planned Agenda come forward.

Frank Hahn spoke about the cost of the School Building Program and the increases in the School Operating Budget and their effect on County property tax rates expressing his opinion that this increase would be detrimental to County residents and future County growth.

Gary Consorta, representing Tellico Lake Properties, spoke against the removal of Notchin Hill Road from the County Roads List. Tellico Lake Properties currently owns 804 acres on and around Notchin Hill Road and 15 platted home sites already exist fronting Notchin Hill Road. He stated that removal of this road from the List would diminish the value of these properties.

Richard Truitt spoke about Director of Schools Wayne Honeycutt's response to the Commission Letter of August 2010 agreeing with parts of the report but disagreeing with other parts.

Pandora Vreeland spoke about the School Building Program emphasizing the high cost of the current plan to build traditional schools and its effect on property taxes versus other less costly options including modular units which offer more options for relocating to facilities where they're most needed when necessary. She also described consolidation of redundant facilities and services called "regionalization" which several other municipal areas in the Country have implemented to consolidate and significantly reduce operating costs. She expressed her opinion that teachers are more important to education than buildings. She requested that the Commission investigate other options, including these, for providing adequate facilities for the schools while keeping cost under control.

Wayne Schnell spoke about the School Building Program, operating costs, number of teachers on the payroll and administrative costs and the effect of these on taxes. He agrees with the comments of Ms. Vreeland regarding "regionalization" of assets as a possible solution and encouraged the Commission to consider these other options. Commissioner Miller spoke in response to the speakers regarding the School Building Program commenting that their points were good and worth consideration but that the Commission has no power to control the funds it provides to the County School Board and that they should direct their comments and suggestions to the School Board where the decisions on how to spend the funds provided by the Commission are made.

Loudon County Director of Schools, Wayne Honeycutt, provided a response to a Commission Letter of August 9, 2010 requesting information on the Board of Education's use of School Operating Fund 141 from 2004-2009.

Mr. Honeycutt provided an in-depth power-point presentation on School Operating Expenses to include: Fixed Cost Increases; Personnel Costs; Teacher's Salaries; Locally Funded Increases; and State and Federal Increases. His response to the question on Significant Increases in Staff with Minimal Increases in Students concentrated on the reasons for the additional positions. On the question of Property Tax Increases from 5.5M to 10.2M in the Past Five Years to Support the School Operating Fund his presentation maintained that school expenses have remained in balance with other County expenses and spoke about Performance Demands; the Impact of BEP 2.0 on Loudon County State Revenue; Loudon County Fiscal Capacity; Loudon County School Revenue Growth; Per Pupil Expenditures; TCAP Value Added Test Scores; Teacher Supply and Demand; Tennessee Graduation Requirements; Average Tennessee PPE Increases; and How Do We Get All the Way Up to Average.

Commissioner Miller thanked Mr. Honeycutt for his presentation and stated that he believes that public safety, education, and roads are the three main functions of county government and that education is very important but that funding alone doesn't guarantee a good education. He stated that the County Commission has a responsibility to the taxpayers of the county and has limited resources to fund all the county's needs. He then presented a rebuttal to Mr. Honeycutt's presentation's conclusion that Loudon County is below average compared to other counties in the State in funding per student. He contends that to make a fair comparison you must remove the four major cities in the State from the equation since their increased resources distort the comparison of counties. He distributed a comparison using numbers without the four cities and concluded that, with this comparison, Loudon County was slightly above average. He stated that, even so, he's very concerned about the cost of education and the need for new schools and their impact on the property taxes and he discussed options for supporting the school operating budget and each's impact on the property taxes. In conclusion, he asked Mr. Honeycutt about the Commission's last question, which wasn't addressed, concerning exploring opportunities and offering options for cutting costs in school funding. Mr. Honeycutt responded that they were working on this and would provide a response in the future.

Commissioner Duff expressed appreciation to Mr. Honeycutt and Mr. Vance for the presentation and stated that he wished that he had not voted for forwarding the Commission letter that prompted this response. He stated that he was frustrated and embarrassed about the situation of the education system in Loudon County and that he wanted our schools to be better than average, stating that when average is our goal, we're in serious trouble. He recommended that the Commission and the School Board need to enact a plan to address fixes to these problems.

Commissioner Shaver thanked **Mr. Honeycutt** and **Mr. Vance** and stated that he wants to best for the county's kids and education system but that the county doesn't have unlimited resources. He stressed that the Board of Education has control of how to spend the funds provided by the Commission. In response to comments in **Mr. Honeycutt's** presentation, he explained where some of the figures used by the Commission in posing their questions came from and expressed Commission concern about the significant increases in school employees.

Commissioner Franke stated that he doesn't want the future to look back at this Commission and say they didn't do their job. He stated that the County has limited resources and the Commission needs to fix the problems the best they can. Commissioner Yarbrough applauded Mr. Honeycutt's presentation and stated that she was embarrassed that the Commission had asked for this report and cited that some of the data presented to him in the Commission's questions wasn't available to everyone. She stated that her main concern is for the pupils of the County and that the Commission needs to solve the problems. She stated that she's rethinking her position regarding the school building program and school funding.

Commissioner Duff announced that he had provided copies of the most recent TCCA News Bulletins to each of the Commissioners and was available to answer any questions or address any concerns they may have.

Commissioner Franke suggested that more Commissioners use the Commissioner's On-line Forum, also available to the public, to discuss topics and share information to help insure that all Commissioners have the same information at the same time.

Commissioner Maples agreed with **Commissioner Shaver's** comments above and stated that she appreciates **Commissioner Miller's** efforts in exploring options for funding and inquiring about spending in an effort to use the taxpayer's money wisely and to try to minimize tax increases as much as possible while still providing a good education for our children.

RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE APPEAL OF THE TENNESSEE VOTER CONFIDENCE ACT

WHEREAS, on June 5, 2008, an act known as the Tennessee Voter Confidence Act was signed into law by Governor Phil Bredesen; and

WHEREAS, on January 22, 2010, Governor Phil Bredesen signed legislation to delay the act known as the Tennessee Voter Confidence Act until November 2012; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires all of Tennessee's ninety-five (95) counties to use optical scan voting machines and paper ballots no later than the November 2012 elections; and

WHEREAS, according to a Coordinator of Elections, only one company has passed the requirements set forth by the EAC, but has not been field tested as required to ensure the scanners operate in accordance with the guidelines set forth by the act:

WHEREAS, implementing this act for the February, August and November elections, the act would cost Loudon County an estimated \$230,662.00 which results in an unfunded mandate; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Election Commission of Loudon County, Tennessee, meeting this 15th day of February, 2011, that:

SECTION 1. Loudon County Election Commission hereby seeks a repeal of the Tennessee Voter Confidence Act if this act cannot be fully funded by the state.

SECTION 2. Loudon County Election Commission hereby requests assistance from the Loudon County Commission, as well as all elected and appointed state officials in repealing the Tennessee Voter Confidence Act.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution shall be recorded upon the minutes of this meeting. Further, additional copies of this Resolution shall be mailed to Loudon County Mayor Estelle Herron, Loudon County Commission Chairman Roy Bledsoe, Governor Bill Haslam, Secretary of State Tre Hargett, the Tennessee State Election Commission, State Senator Randy McNally, State Representative Jimmy Matlock, State Representative Julia Hurley, Lieutenant Governor Ron Ramsey and Speaker of the House Beth Harwell.

WHEREFORE, this Resolution shall take effect upon adoption, the general welfare requiring it.
