APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved by Commissioner Hudson and seconded by Commissioner Blair that the minutes of the April meeting be approved as presented. The vote was unanimous.

RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING
ROSE KEENER

Commissioner James Hartsook read a resolution memorializing the life of Rose Keener. It was moved by Commissioner Hartsook and Seconded by Commissioner Blair that this memorial be documented in the minutes of the Court and a certified copy be sent to her family members. The vote was unanimous. This being attached hereto as Resolution No. 57-79, Exhibit A.

PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT

Mr. Dave Folz of the Planning Commission gave the general report of the April meeting of the commission which is attached hereto as Exhibit B.

REZONING REQUEST--DENIED
FREEMAN R. DISHNER

After much discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Eldridge and seconded by Commissioner Jones that the rezoning request for Parcel 3, Map 15, from A-2, Rural Residential to C-2, General Commercial be denied. The property belongs to Mr. Freeman R. Dishner. The vote was unanimous to deny the request.

BUILDING COMMISSIONER
REPORT

The building commissioner report was given by Jack Henry. The money collected was \$1,235.00 which makes the property value \$452,000.00 and amounting to \$7,200.00 on the tax rolls.

SCHOOL BUDGET ACCEPTED

It was moved by Commissioner Blair and seconded by Commissioner Hudson that the tentative school budget for 1979-80 be adopted. The vote was unanimous.

LOUDON COUNTY MEMORIAL
HOSPITAL REPORT

Mr. Gay Hamilton gave the hospital report, recommending that the hospital borrow money on bond issue to purchase a chemistry lab analyzer. Upon motion of Commissioner Hudson seconded by Commissioner Blair it was approved. The vote was unanimous.

PURCHASING COMMITTEE
REPORT

Buddy Jenkins gave the Purchasing Committee report which is attached hereto as Exhibit C.

BUDGET AMENDMENTS

It was moved by Commissioner Hudson and seconded by Commissioner Hartsook that the budget amendments be accepted with the exception of the General School Budget which was pertaining to the selling of the Vocational School House. The vote was unanimous. Budget amendments being attached hereto as Exhibit D.

DISCUSSION OF OBJECTIVES
FOR SENIOR CITIZENS CENTER

It was moved by Commissioner Hartsook and seconded by Commissioner Hudson that the project objectives for the Senior Citizen's Center for 1979-80 be approved. The vote was unanimous. Attached as Exhibit D.

DISCUSSION OF JAPANESE
BEETLE

Mr. McCall gave a complete report on how to control the Japanese Beetle. After some discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner Blair that the County appropriate \$1,400.00 for the control of the Beetle. The vote was unanimous.

APPOINTMENT TO
LOUDON COUNTY LIBRARY
BOARD

Upon motion of Commissioner Hartsook and seconded by Commissioner Eldridge the following were elected to the Loudon County Library Board--Eddie Tom Smith to replace Walter Hedge, Mrs. Sandra Tipton to replace Betty Murr, and Helen Cole to be reappointed for a second term. For the Regional Board Mrs. Walter Hedge was appointed to replace Donald Perkey and Mrs. Mary Catherine Longwell was reappointed. The vote was unanimous.

DISCUSSION OF TRUCK
FOR GLENDALE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Judge Russell told the Court that the Civil Defense Director had made application for a State Surplus truck which would go to the Glendale Community fire department for conversion into a fire truck.

DISCUSSION OF SCHOOL
BOARD BILL

After much discussion concerning the elected school board bill the County Commission made two amendments before returning the bill to Nashville for adoption.

The principal idea of the bill is that the school board be elected by popular vote and not appointed by the commission remained, but the procedure in the initial election phase was changed. Also the bill called for nine school districts, but the commission asked that it be amended to have nine school board members elected from the same apportionment districts as they are.

Provided the changes are made in the Legislature and they are expected to be with no problems, the first of a series of elections replacing the appointed members as their terms expire with elected members will be held in 1980.

In 1980 two present seats and two new seats added to bring membership to nine will be elected for a four year term. The current terms to be included in the 1980 vote are now held by Gary Kimsey of the first civil district. Kimsey's term expires later this year but is expected to be reappointed to the board for one year. In addition to the seats held by Kimsey and Hagler an additional member from the first and fourth districts, and one from the second will be elected for a four year term making the membership nine. In 1982, John Hutton, third district, and John Roberts, second district, terms will expire and their seats will be for election for two years. In 1984 the four elected in 1980 will stand for election on a four year term again along with John Hutton and John Roberts and seats currently held by Leonard Liles and Ted Wampler.

In 1986 the first district seat held by Charles Giles will be elected for a two year term, thus completing the election cycle. The first full slate election will be held in 1988. It was moved by Commissioner Arp and seconded by Commissioner Eldridge that these amendments be approved. The vote was unanimous for this.

CLOSING OF TUCK ROAD

Upon request by realtor Carl Wattenbarger it was moved by Commissioner Blair and seconded by Commissioner Jones that Tuck Road be closed. The vote was unanimous.

ACCEPTANCE OF PRECINCTS

It was moved by Commissioner Blair and seconded by Commissioner Hudson and the vote was unanimous to accept the Boundary lines between the Luttrell, Philadelphia, Loudon Outside, Loudon Inside, Loudon Inside West, Piney, Glendale and Greenback precincts as set forth in the Resolution which is attached hereto as Resolution No. 58-79, Exhibit E.

ELECTION OF NOTARY
PUBLICS

It was moved by Commissioner Hudson and seconded by Commissioner Blair that the following Notary Publics be elected: Volena H. Maples, Aileen Watkins, Charles T. Eblen, Robert Lewis, Linda P. Sitzlar, Bonnie Marrow, and Pennie S. Daniels. The vote was unanimous.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business come before the Court, Court adjourned.



SUBJECT: General Report - Loudon County Regional Planning
Commission

The Loudon County Regional Planning Commission met in regular session April 19, 1979 and considered the following items:

1. Voted unanimously not to recommend the rezoning of Parcel 122.1, Map 17 from R-1, Suburban Residential to C-2, General Commercial. The property is owned by Mr. John Malone, Midway Road. A public hearing has been scheduled for the June meeting of the commission.
2. Voted unanimously to recommend the rezoning of the C. A. Wilson property of Shaw Ferry Road from C-2, General Commercial to R-1, Suburban Residential. A public hearing has been scheduled for the June meeting of the commission.
3. Took no action on a rezoning request by Mr. R. C. Deloizer for Parcel 6.5, Map (A-1 to R-1) since he agreed to withdraw the request.
4. Deferred action on a rezoning request by Mr. M. L. Wilkerson for Parcel 52, Map 8 (R-1 to C-2) to allow time for a public hearing and additional study.
5. Discussed county road standards with Mrs. Allen Giles.
6. Heard Road Engineer's report, the Building Commissioner's report and the Staff report.

PROJECT OBJECTIVES FOR 1979-1980

- OBJECTIVE # 1:
To provide outreach to those persons who cannot come to the Center or who hesitate to come prior to the establishment of a personal trust.
- OBJECTIVE # 2:
To invite and encourage more low-income and minority elderly to participate in the Center programs.
- OBJECTIVE # 3:
To distribute information on the Loudon County Senior Citizens' Center to as many persons and organizations as possible.
- OBJECTIVE # 4:
To greatly expand the recreational activities offered at the Center.
- OBJECTIVE #5:
To increase the membership of the Loudon County Senior Citizens' Center by approximately 600 people by June 30, 1980.
- OBJECTIVE # 6:
To expand existing programs of the Center which include legal services, mental health services, health care services and intergenerational projects.
- OBJECTIVE # 7:
To increase the number of volunteer opportunities available in the project.
- OBJECTIVE # 8:
To expand the number of educational opportunities and services offered by the Center.
- OBJECTIVE # 9:
To provide programs at the Center which will promote the development of positive and constructive attitudes toward aging.
- OBJECTIVE # 10:
To help the Senior Citizens in local communities to establish a satellite Center in their towns.
- OBJECTIVE # 11:
To increase the availability of transportation services in the County for the elderly.

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OBJECTIVE # 12:

To expand the Chore Service (employment) opportunities for members.

OBJECTIVE # 13:

To expand Information and Referral Programs through the Center.

HOW AND WHY THESE OBJECTIVES WERE CHOSEN:

Each of these objectives was chosen on the basis of needs of the elderly in Loudon County and expressed desires of Senior Citizens on what they want to happen at their Center and in their community. The Plan Development Committee, Building and Furnishings Committees, Executive Board, Senior Citizens' Council and numerous individuals helped form these objectives.

These objectives are considered to be the most important and logical way of reaching people, meeting the needs of our rural county and providing the best services.

2. As stated earlier in this grant major action steps of the Loudon County Multipurpose Senior Citizens' Center conform to the specific Projects Standards on pages 5 and 6 of the Policies and Procedures for Senior Centers.

The Center is staffed by a full time director. The Center is open five days a week, eight hours a day for a total of 40 hours. Coordination with the Area Agency on Aging in the East Tennessee Development District is on-going.

The project services and activities currently being provided at the Center are listed and described in detail below.

1. Recreation and free time activities include:

- a. Rook parties anytime
- b. Bridge parties anytime
- c. Billiards anytime
- d. Games anytime
- e. Television viewing anytime
- f. Library services anytime
- g. Monthly birthday parties with bingo or special events.
- h. Monthly covered dish lunches.
- i. Bowling weekly at local lanes
- j. Trips scheduled periodically
- k. Quilting anytime
- l. Monthly Bible Study Breakfast
- m. Movies

2. Information, counseling and referral are available at all times through the Center.

3. Volunteer opportunities currently available at the Center for Senior Centers are:

- a. Friendly Visitors program for Senior Citizens to visit in nursing homes. This program is carried out by groups and individuals at their convenience.
- b. Committee memberships at the Center including May Committee, Furnishings Committee, Building Committee, Plan Development Committee, and others. Committee members make major decisions to go before the Senior Citizens Council for approval regarding Center building and operation.
- c. Craft volunteers are used bi-monthly as teachers.
- d. Volunteers drive Senior Citizens to doctors and hospital.

4. Activities specifically oriented toward men include:
 - a. Billiards
 - b. Woodworking Shop
 - c. Building Committee serves as supervisors of new addition
5. Regular visits are scheduled from the following agencies:
 - a. Mental Health weekly
 - b. Social Security weekly
 - c. Area Office on Aging Legal Referral Representative montly
6. The annual recruiting program designed to specifically invite low-income and minority persons to become members is held each year in May or June. Contact is made at the Department of Human Service, Public Housing, Nutrition Site and Food Stamp Office.
7. A telephone outreach program is in effect. The Outreach Worker contacts members who live alone and want a friendly call occasionally.
8. A friendly visitation project for shut-ins and persons living alone is conducted by the Outreach Worker and Volunteers.
9. A friendly visitation project for nursing home patients is conducted by Outreach Worker and Volunteers.
10. Arts and crafts classes are offered bi-monthly and involve the community through volunteer support and craft supply discounts. Items are sold at the Christmas Bazaar/Craft Sale held annually at the Center.
11. Regular public information and education programs include:
 - a. Weekly newspaper articles published
 - b. Weekly radio show
 - c. Speaking to community groups about three times a month on the average
 - d. Publicizing of the "Over Easy" television program.
12. A stand-by volunteer list of older persons is compiled and available through the Center to the County Judge, local mayors, civic clubs and social agencies, for use in planning and coordinating community projects.
13. Active participation in a project sponsored by another agency describes our Mental Health project. Overlook Mental Health Clinic personnel gathered together their Senior Citizen clients and formed the "Socialization Group". The group meets at the Center where an atmosphere of warmth and non-institutionalization is achieved.
14. Activities designed to involve the participants in solving specific problems of older people include, again, the "Socialization Group" and a soon to be implemented "Single Living Adjustment Group" for recent widows and widowers.
15. Congregate meals (Title VII) are offered by Mid-East Community Action Agency. However, we refer people to the program and speak at the nutrition site on occasion.
16. A physical fitness program is planned for implementation as soon as the teacher can begin.

17. Other agencies which offer services to Senior Citizens are invited to use the Center when feasible. The Social Security representatives use the Center weekly.
18. A plan for utilization of the Center's facilities and participants in emergency situations has been approved and coordinated with the Loudon County Civil Defense.
19. An effective community relations program conveying to all members of the community, not only what the Center does, but also what older persons are, and what they can do is in effect to help combat negative stereotypes of Aging. News media (radio, television, newspaper) and public information programs to groups are the major vehicles used to do this.
20. A volunteer transportation program is in effect utilizing mainly Senior Citizen drivers to transport other Senior Citizens. Also a taxi reimbursement program is in effect. The Center also has the part-time use of a van for transportation of the elderly.
21. A monthly newsletter and calendar of events is mailed to all Center members, Churches, Social Service Agencies and some businesses.
22. A bi-monthly blood pressure clinic is in operation utilizing a Volunteer Senior Citizen R.N. to take the readings. In the event an unusual reading is made, participants are referred to their doctors or the Health Clinic.
23. Educational classes such as Defensive Driving and How To Take Your Own Blood Pressure are scheduled periodically.
24. The Chore Service is an employment opportunity offered through the Center on an on-going basis. Members may call seeking work or seeking someone to work for them. Referrals are made when requested.
25. Intergenerational projects currently involve high school students who work with the Senior Citizens in the "Socialization Group", helping with activities and socialization.
26. Monthly Bible Study Breakfast features good nutrition and spiritual education.

Resolution 58-79

BE IT RESOLVED that the boundary lines between the Luttrell, Philadelphia, Loudon Outside, Loudon Inside East, Loudon Inside West, Piney, Glendale and Greenback Precincts are set forth as follows, with all persons living within these boundaries to vote in said precinct. Any person changed by any line, previously set forth, shall be notified and changed by the Loudon County Election Commission, but until such change is made, they may vote in the precinct where they are now registered.

LUTTRELL PRECINCT, 4th District of Loudon County, Tennessee, shall be all of that area located in the western portion of Loudon County, adjoining Monroe County, McMinn County and Roane County lines, and being all the property located west of the following line between Luttrell and Philadelphia Precincts:

BEGINNING on the Monroe County line where the Old Sweetwater Pike enters Loudon County; thence along Sweetwater Pike Road, to Pond Gap Road; thence with Pond Gap Road to Stockton Valley Road; thence with Stockton Valley Road to the point where it intersects with Jim Dyke Road; thence due North towards the Roane County line where Highway 72 enters into Roane County, Tennessee. Property colored in Green on the attached map.

PHILADELPHIA PRECINCT, 4th District of Loudon County, Tennessee, shall be that portion of land in the western portion of Loudon County, adjoining the Luttrell Precinct, as herein designated:

BEGINNING in the extreme northwest portion of said precinct line where Stockton Valley Road joins Jim Dyke

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Road (commonly known as Buzzard's Roost); thence with Jim Dyke Road to where it intersects with Prospect Road, near Prospect Baptist Church; thence South with Prospect Road to Dry Valley Road, to the Roberson Springs Road to its intersection with Ridge Road; thence due South through various farmlands to the intersection of Calloway Road and U.S. Highway No. 11; thence with Calloway Road in a Southeasterly direction to Grimes Road; thence with Grimes Road to Steekee Creek Road; thence with Steekee Road in a southerly direction to the Monroe County line; thence with the boundary line of Monroe County to the Luttrell Precinct boundary at the Old Sweetwater Pike. Property colored in Yellow on the attached map.

LOUDON OUTSIDE PRECINCT, 1st District of Loudon County, Tennessee, shall be all of that territory of the western portion of Loudon County, which lies north and east of the boundaries herein between Luttrell and Philadelphia Precincts, as hereinabove established, and bounded on the West by Luttrell and Philadelphia Precinct lines; on the North by the Roane County line and the Tennessee River; on the East by the Piney or Steekee Precinct; and on the South by Monroe County, and excluding all that property located within the boundaries of the City limits of Loudon:

GLENDALE PRECINCT, 3rd District of Loudon County, Tennessee, shall be that portion of Loudon County, Tennessee, in the center portion of the extreme eastern part of Loudon County, Tennessee, and bounded on the North by the Tennessee River; on the East by Knox and Blount County lines; on the South by the line between Glendale and Greenback Precincts, as hereinafter set forth, and on the West by the Little Tennessee River.

The division line between Glendale and Greenback Precinct BEGINNING on the Little Tennessee River line, near Sinking Creek Road; thence with Sinking Creek Road in a Westerly direction to the Campground Road; thence East with Campground Road to its intersection with Old Highway 95 to Greenback; thence in an Easterly direction, in a straight line between various farmlands to the intersection of Fisher

Lane and Meadow Road at or near the Blount County line.

River Road crossing railroad bridge at school; thence

point where old Huff Ferry entered the Tennessee
River, now called McQueen Road (private).
