SUBJECT: General Report of the Loudon County Regional Planning Commission

At the May 15th meeting, the planning commission considered the following items:

- A rezoning request by W. D. Cassidy, Simpson Road, for Parcel 183, Map 17 from C-2, General Commercial to R-1, Suburban Residential (5th District). The commission voted unanimously to recommend the rezoning of the property as requested. A public hearing has been scheduled for the July meeting of the County Commission.
- Recommended that Parcels 2, 3-0, 3-1, an unopened alley, and Parcel 6, Group H, Map 29-E be rezoned from C-2, General Commercial to R-1, Suburban Residential. These properties are located between U.S. 11 and Huntsville Hollow Road in the 5th District. A public hearing has been scheduled for the July meeting. (The property owners involved are: John S. O'Neall, Evan T. Jones, West Lenoir Church of God, and Tony L. Hughes.)
- 3. Recommended that Parcels 34, 35, 36, 37, 37-1, 38, 39, 40, 40-1, 40-2, 40-3, 41, 42, 43, 44, 44-1, 44-2, 44-3, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49-0, 49-1, and 50, Group A, Map 29-J be rezoned from A-2, Rural Residential to R-1, Suburban Residential. These parcels are located between U.S. 11 and Huntsville Hollow Road in the 5th District. A public hearing has been scheduled for the July meeting.
- Heard reports from the Road Engineer, Building Commissioner, and staff planner.

The planning commission discussed and adopted a set of goals and policies (copy attached) for the Tellico Project as an update to the Loudon County Land Use Plan.

CHAPTER THREE: LAND USE POLICIES AND PLAN

TELLICO PROJECT

- /- .

In addition to the general goals and development policies and standards contained in this chapter of the Loudon County Land Use Plan, the Loudon County Regional Planning Commission has developed the following more detailed development policies and standards for the Tellico Project area. These policies and standards will guide future growth in that area so that the desired goals can be achieved in the most efficient manner.

Since the abandonment of the Timberlake Newtown concept by the Tennessee Valley Authority, a general normative planning void has existed with respect to identifying and adopting' a set of goals and objectives for the area which would give the project a purpose and direction. This section of the land use plan will help to fill that void and establish specific policies and standards for the development of the Loudon County portion of the project. This project is expected to have a substantial impact on the growth, pattern of development, and financial structure of Loudon County and therefore, the planning commission feels that the opportunity to incorporate and adopt sound land use policies and standards for the project should not be lost.

Project Goals

Guided by the overall goal of promoting the organization of land uses in a balanced, functional, and mutually compatible manner relative to the needs of the county, the long range goals for development of the Tellico project are as follows:

- To provide a national demonstration of an efficient, functional, 1. and well-planned development which will create a unique living and working environment for the people of Loudon County.
- 2. To provide for timed and sequential phases of development which will insure that an integrated group of urban services will be available as development occurs so as to eliminate the financial and environmental burdens associated with an urban sprawl development pattern.
- To foster financially feasible community and regional growth by creating opportunities for increased economic activity 3. through the optimum investment of private capital which will provide area residents with enhanced employment opportunities

and which will provide Loudon County with an increasing tax base commensurate with or exceeding the demand for revenues to pay for any public costs that might occur as a result of that development.

- To insure that the development which occurs in the project area is fully compatible with any existing development or planned development along or near the boundaries of the Tellico Project area.
- 5. To insure that the general plan for the Tellico Project area will reflect and incorporate standards, policies, regulations, and guidelines which are no less than those contained in the Loudon County Zoning Resolution and the Loudon County Subdivision Regulations as well as those subdivision regulations of the Loudon Regional Planning Commission and the Lenoir City Regional Planning Commission.
- 6. To maintain, improve, and inhance the high quality of the natural environment by planning, designing, and constructing facilities which are compatible with the ecological, natural, and cultural assests of the Tellico area.
- 7. To provide for the establishment and/or expansion of educational, cultural, public and medical facilities and services required for the people who reside within the project area with such needed facilities and services to be funded or provided by revenues generated from or related to developments in the project area.

Development Policies:

- Rational cost-benefit analyses should be conducted and employed to determine the financial feasibility of any proposed development in the Tellico Project area in order to assess the fiscal impact on the Loudon County budget and the services funded or provided by the public sector.
- 2. As part of the General Plan for the Tellico Project, a detailed implementation plan should be developed which includes the process or processes which will be used to transfer land to the private sector and the methods or techniques used to insure that any development proposed on such transfered land will meet the requirements and specifications necessary to comply with the general plan and any of its component parts.
- 3. Residential development densities should be determined on the basis of topography, proximity to major streets and highways, soil capability, the proximity to areas of work collection and distribution facilities, and the

availability of urban services such as water and wastewater treatment. No development whether it be residential, commercial, or industrial shall be allowed without a public water supply adequate to provide fire protection.

- 4. Land reserved for industrial uses should not usurp other needs nor be arranged so as to retard proper residential or commercial growth. The amount of land reserved for each particular land use shall have a rational relationship to the projected population's space needs and location requirements.'
- 5. Recognize that the agricultural use of land may be a suitable short-term or interim use in some areas and a long-term or permanent use in other areas as long as intelligent conservation practices are required to be employed. Futher, it should be recognized that game or wildlife preserves where hunting is permitted and the agricultural use of the land are incompatible land uses and should not overlap or coincide.

A RESOLUTION AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF LOUDON COUNTY, TENNESSEE, PURSUANT TO CHAPTER FOUR, SECTION 13-405 OF THE TENNESSEE CODE ANNOTATED, TO REZONE PARCEL 35-2, MAP 28 FROM A-1, AGRUCULTURE-FORESTRY TO C-2, GENERAL COMMERCIAL.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Loudon County Commission that the Zoning Map of Loudon County, Tennessee, be amended as follows:

I. That Parcel 35-2, Map 28, said parcel being located in the 5th Civil District off Old Sugar Limb Road, be rezoned from A-1, Agriculture-Forestry to C-2, General Commercial.
