Last month you were notified of proposed legislation being considered by the legislature which if enacted will increase the minimum retirement benefit for retired and active employees with ten (10) or more years of service. This increased benefit will be granted automatically to state employees and teachers but will be optional to political subdivisions. As of this date the bill has been passed by both the House and the Senate and has been sent to the Governor for his signature.

The increase in the minimum benefit is as follows:

	"Old" Minimum	"New" Minimum
Class A & Group I	\$7.00 \$7.66	\$8.00 \$8.66

The dollar figure in the above chart is the payment to be received per month for each year of creditable service rendered.

The increase in the minimum benefit will provide a significant increase in benefits received by members who retired with a five year average salary of \$6,400 or less. The majority of the financial impact will be for retirees who have been retired for several years and for retired and active bus drivers and cafeteria workers. The following is an example of the effect of the legislation on the minimum benefit:

For political subdivisions which have elected to provide cost-of-living adjustments, the new monthly minimum benefit will become the new base upon which all future cost-of-living adjustments will be calculated.

As is always the case, the political subdivision will be totally responsible for the cost of this increase in benefits. For your information we have enclosed actuarial calculations of the estimated increase in the accrued liability and the increase in the employer contribution rate in the event the governing body elects to authorize the increased benefit. Please note that it is necessary for you to sign and return one copy of the actuarial information to our office regardless of whether or not you plan to authorize this increased benefit. For political subdivisions having retirees receiving a minimum benefit, we have enclosed a list of these retirees reflecting their current benefit and what their benefit will be if the increased minimum benefit is authorized.

The legislation specifically states that the governing body of a political subdivision electing to provide the increased minimum benefit to its current members and retirees must pass a resolution authorizing the increase prior to June 15, 1984 to be effective July 1, 1984 or by May 15, 1985, to be effective July 1, 1985. The resolution to provide the increased benefit is enclosed.

RESOLUTION TO ADOPT THE 1984 MINIMUM BENEFIT PROVISIONS

WHEREAS, in 1984, the Tennessee legislature passed legislation which would permit political subdivisions to increase the guaranteed minimum retirement benefit for employees and retirees of such political subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, such law will increase the monthly minimum benefit for Group I and Class A members and retirees with ten (10) or more years from \$7.00 to \$8.00 for each year of service and for Class B members and retirees with ten (10) or more years of service from \$7.66 to \$8.66 for each year of service; and

WHEREAS, the political subdivision will be responsible for the increased liability upon implementation of the new benefit levels for its retirees and employees; and

WHERZAS, the legislation permitting the increased benefit provides that in order for it to apply to a political subdivision, the chief governing body of the political subdivision must pass a resolution authorizing the increased benefit and accepting the liability therefor; and

WHEREAS, in order for this increased benefit to apply to retirees July 1, 1984 this resolution must be passed by June 15, 1984;

In the alternative, the law provides that if the resolution is passed after June 15, 1984 and before May 15, 1985, it will apply to all benefits paid after July 1, 1985.
