#### City of Lenoir City Resolution No. 2005-4-11-1678A

#### A RESOLUTION AND INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN LOUDON COUNTY, TENNESSEE AND LENOIR CITY, TENNESSEE REGARDING LENOIR CITY, TENNESSEE ANNEXATIONS

WHEREAS, Lenoir City, Tennessee approved the annexation of approximately 40 parcels of property on November 24, 2003; and

WHEREAS, Loudon County, Tennessee challenged said annexation by declaratory judgment action filed in the Chancery Court of Loudon County, Tennessee, civil action number 10456; and

WHEREAS, Lenoir City, Tennessee and Loudon County, Tennessee have worked together to resolve the issues in the said declaratory judgment action and to provide for future annexations by Lenoir City, Tennessee.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND AGREED**, by both Loudon County, Tennessee and Lenoir City, Tennessee that the declaratory judgment action referenced above be dismissed and future annexations by Lenoir City, Tennessee be governed by the following terms and conditions:

- The Urban and Planned Growth Boundaries as agreed upon and approved by the Tennessee State Planning Advisory Committee on June 28, 2000 are hereby confirmed and ratified; and
- The November 24, 2003 annexation of Lenoir City, Tennessee by Ordinance Number 2003-11-24-1582A, including approximately 40 parcels within the Lenoir City Urban Growth Area located along Highway 321 North shall remain in full force and effect; and
- 3. All future parcels of property to be included for annexation(s) by Lenoir City, Tennessee shall be located within the Urban and Planned Growth Boundaries referenced above and shall be annexed by request of the parcel property owner(s), or by their consent to annexation, without regard to subject property's contiguous nature to the actual city limits of Lenoir City, Tennessee, then in effect at the time of the annexation. In all other respects future annexations by Lenoir City shall comply with Tennessee Public Chapter 1101; and
- 4. Both governing bodies for Lenoir City, Tennessee and Loudon County, Tennessee agree to cooperate and provide necessary information upon request regarding annexations by the 911 dispatch office to such office for efforts to minimize appropriate responding information confusion; and
- 5. Any property parcels requesting annexation by Lenoir City which are located outside of the Urban and Planned Growth Boundaries referenced above shall be written request to be approved first by Loudon County Commission, and then secondarily approved by Lenoir City Council in order to be annexed; and
- 6. This resolution and interlocal agreement shall remain in effect for the duration of the Public Chapter 1101 Growth Plan approved by the state and local government planning advisory planning committee of June 28, 2000, and any subsequent amendments or modifications thereto, or until such time as both parties hereto agree cooperatively to repeal, alter, amend or disregard this agreement; and

7. Upon the adoption of this resolution and interlocal agreement by each of the governing bodies, the litigation between the parties and the Chancery Court for Loudon County, Tennessee, civil action number 10456 shall be dismissed by agreed order, taxing costs equally to both parties; and

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, that this resolution and interlocal agreement shall take effect as of the date of acceptance by both the County Commission of Loudon County, Tennessee and the City Council of Lenoir City, Tennessee, the public welfare requiring it.

## Resolution Enabling Authority To Provide For Counties To Adopt An Excise Tax

Whereas, many Tennessee counties continue to experience dramatic growth necessitating the need for construction of infrastructure improvements and other expenditures related to growth; and

Whereas, insufficient revenue is derived from real property taxes to provide the needed infrastructure and meet other necessary expenditures without substantial increases in the real property tax rate; and

Whereas, counties feel that Tennessee should adopt enabling legislation that would permit counties to adopt an Excise Tax based on the Washington State Tax providing for ¼ of 1% on each sale of real property; and

Whereas, an Excise Tax would provide for a recurring source of revenue, is broad based with a small increment and is less likely to be affected by short term downturns in the economy than development taxes or impact fees.

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Loudon County Commission, meeting in regular session on this 4<sup>th</sup> day of April, 2005, does hereby respectfully request the Tennessee General Assembly enact enabling authority to provide for counties to adopt and Excise Tax based on the Washington State Excise tax providing for at least ¼ of 1% on each sale of real property going to the county with local government eligibility to be contingent on a test associated with demonstrated rapid growth patterns.

# A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE FACILITY SERVING LENOIR CITY AND SURROUNDING LOUDON COUNTY AREAS

WHEREAS, the United States Postal Service facility, located at 217 E. Broadway and serving Lenoir City and portions of northern Loudon County and West Knox County was constructed in 1938; and

WHEREAS, between 1940 and 2003, Loudon County experienced a 110% increase in population growing from 19,838 to 41,624, and

WHEREAS, Loudon County's population is projected to increase by 24% over the next 10 years, most of the increase centered in the area served by the Lenoir City Post Office, and within the next 2 years an addition 4-5 routes will be added to handle new residential and nonresidential growth, and

WHEREAS, demand for postal services has increased steadily, this is best reflected in the volume of material handled through the Lenoir City facility. Since 2002, DPS letters have increased by 16%, flat volume by 38% and parcel volume by 54%, and

WHEREAS, increases in population and demand for USPS services further contribute to the facility's deficient conditions, this is readily apparent with respect to overcrowded floor space for processing of the present volume of mail service in the current 5,000 sq. ft. facility, and

WHEREAS, customer accessibility is restricted with the absence of off-street parking and handicapped parking and congestion caused by vehicles using the drop off mail boxes located on Hill Street and substandard on-street parking along Broadway (U.S. Highway 11), and

WHEREAS, expansion of the current facility is not considered a viable option given the limited land area for facility expansion as well as inadequacies for parking.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Loudon County Commission, assembled on this the 4<sup>th</sup> day of April 2005, the commission does hereby support and encourage the United States Postal Service to provide funding in the next fiscal year budget for the construction of a new facility to serve Lenoir City and the northern and eastern portions of Loudon County, Tennessee.

# Loudon County Commission 4-4-05

#### Shaw Ferry Road /Hwy US 11 Intersection

Mr. Chairman this chart shows the accident record for eighteen years.

It clearly shows a drastic reduction in the number of accidents from thirteen in 1989 to one in 2003 with three in 2004 of which **two** were caused by drivers running through the stop sign.

The accomplished reductions have occurred with increases in traffic.

The results of the implemented changes and improvements are clearly identifiable.

None of the three in 2004 are contributable to deficiencies in the intersection structure or obstructions prohibiting visibility.

Mr. Chairman improvements have been contributed in several ways and by several groups.

In December 1995 Loudon County entered into a contract with the Tennessee Department of Transportation and implemented a safety improvement grant for the East Side of Hwy11 at Shaw Ferry Road.

There still remained obstructions to drivers sight distance, both Hwy 11 and on Shaw Ferry Road. Stop signs were not visible to approaching drivers. Approach warning signs were non existent. Shaw Ferry traffic sight vision was obstructed by highway markers and other miscellaneous objects. Highway driver's sight vision was restricted for Shaw Ferry's approaching traffic.

Signage for the Hwy 11 approaches by Shaw Ferry drivers was virtually none existent. Stop Signs were not visible to approaching traffic.

TDOT Signage and Marking's Supervisor came in September 1998 to this intersection and relocated his signs and provided the approach signs for both sides on Shaw Ferry Road.

Loudon County Highway Department installed these signs and cut back right of way growth that blocked sight distance and signage visibility. Public signs were a continual nuisance and vision obstruction. After taking these down over a period of time this problem subsided.

Local Residents contributed to sight vision distances by cutting growth, tree limbs etc.

TDOT has performed studies and traffic counts at this intersection. I have had traffic counts done there two times. February 2002 Loudon County had an overhead street light installed.

Presently this intersection's sight distance is even better due to the large growth being removed by the owner of the property at the south east corner to the intersection.


This intersection is now fully visible to approaching Shaw Ferry and US Highway 11 traffic.

# Resolution Supporting SB1240/HB1578 "Bottle Bill"

Whereas, litter is a growing problem in Loudon County and other Tennessee counties; and

Whereas, the state has provided "litter grant" monies to local governments and organized "Keep Tennessee Beautiful" to help educate the public through anti-litter campaigns; and

Whereas, while these are good programs in promoting a litter-free Tennessee, roadsides are still covered with bottles, cans and other unsightly trash; and

Whereas, in an effort to reduce roadside litter, SB1240/HB1578 has been introduced entitled "Tennessee Deposit Beverage Container Recycling Act of 2005"; and

Whereas, passage of the proposed legislation would give Tennessee the opportunity to become the leader it he Southeastern United States in litter cleanup and recycling, without the higher taxpayer expense associated with other recycling programs; and

Whereas, under this legislation the Tennessee bottle bill would place the financial burden on the person who are doing the littering and thus do not return their containers for redemption of the bottle deposit; and

Whereas, under this legislation the Tennessee bottle bill would encourage more people not to litter and to return their empty beverage containers, thus it will also increasw the amount of container recycling; and

Whereas, according to the Container Recycling Institute (CRI) of Arlington, Virginia, last year Tennesseans consumed 3.9 billion beverages in containers, including 2.2 billion in aluminum cans, 1.0 billion in plastic bottles and 700 million in glass bottles; and

Whereas, in "bottle bill" states, CRI studies show that a nickel deposit generates an average rate of redemption of approximately 70 - 80%, resulting in projected estimates of state revenues from the those who do not return their containers of approximately \$58 million per year; and

Whereas, states that have implemented a "bottle bill" have eliminated much of the roadside litter and have been able to promote recycling through the process.

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Loudon County Commission, meeting in regular session assembled this 4<sup>th</sup> day of April, 2005, hereby supports SB1240/HB1578, contingent upon local governments' continuing to receive litter grant funding or an equivalent amount from a similar program.

Be It Further Resolved that the County Clerk shall submit copies of this Resolution to our Loudon County Legislative Delegation urging them to also support this bill.

This resolution shall become effective immediately, the public welfare requiring it.
